In the UK, from c.1970 corpus linguistics began in two different ways: the resource-driven approach (associated with the University of Lancaster) and the research-driven approach (associated with the University of Birmingham). This talk will trace the development of the English 'corpus revolution' from that time up to the present, and will consider what challenges loom in the future.



The rise of *cos* and the downfall of *for*: changes in English reason conjunctions over the past 100 years

Two notable developments in the use of English reason conjunctions over the past 100 years have been (1) the steep decline in frequency of the reason conjunction *for* and, in contrast, (2) the consistent rise in frequency of the reason conjunction *(be)cause,* increasingly reduced in speech to the monosyllable /kəz/ (often written *cos* in transcription). This presentation will try to explain the relationship between these two trends in terms of such diachronic processes of grammaticalization and colloquialization. The corpora used in this study include the Brown 'family' of corpora and the American English corpora COCA and COHA.
